



Editorial Policy

Authors can submit their articles in several formats. *Adlerian Dynamics* publishes scholarship in the following sections:

Theories in dialogue, dedicated to Theories and Epistemologies. This section will also consider the interdisciplinary dialogue: each discipline presents its own epistemology, enabling the development of their own theories and practices, facing other disciplines and techniques.

Articles of this section are no more than 50 000 characters (about 20 pages) in length, in Times New Roman 12, single-spaced (spaces, references and endnotes are included in this count).

Clinics haute-couture, devoted to Clinics, Techniques and Psychodiagnostics. This is the primary focus of our professional community, directly at the heart of our profession and this journal. This kind of continuing education will provide ideas, reflections and practical actions to improve our professional practice and knowledge to provide the best customized therapy to our patients. The IAAP considers psychopathology and its teaching a main element of the technique of empathy in the relationship to the patient. It is a keystone of our profession and therefore of its training.

Articles of this section are no more than 25 000 characters (about 10 pages) in length, in Times New Roman 12, single spaced (included spaces, references and endnotes).

The Psychosocial Field, an opening to Psychoeducation. This section is solidly anchored in the Adlerian tradition of evolving and communicating equally and constantly with social life and its individuals. Adler did not want to follow the Freudian attitude of limiting himself to a theory of the mind of “pathological man”, but he sought to understand the human mind as such and to formulate a theory of its universal functioning and its social anchorage.

Articles of this section are no more than 20 000 characters (about 8 pages) in length, in Times New Roman 12, single spaced. More oriented to practice, these articles have a reduced number of references and endnotes.

News and views. DA-AD also wants to provide a space for entertainment to its readers through contemporary Adlerian perspectives on current events in the fields of politics, education, sociology, aesthetics, philosophy, history, anthropology, and moreover. We publish reviews of books (scientific, literary, journalistic, new released or classics), as well as films, documentaries and other artistic works.

Reviews are no more than 5 000 characters (about 2 pages) in length, in Times New Roman 12, single spaced).

Intimate Journal of a Therapist. A freer, more creative space for therapists, in the broadest sense of the term, of all kind of clinical orientations and professional horizons.

Articles could be between 3 000 and 12 000 characters in length (no more than 5 pages).



Instructions for Authors

The journal accepts articles in English (or in French for French speakers). Priority is given to original articles, although papers that have already been written or published will not be excluded.

Acceptable Formats: Microsoft Word (.doc) (any recent version); OpenDocument (.odt), or Rich Text Format (.rtf). Authors must submit a word processing file (.doc, .odt, .rtf), not a PDF.

Articles submitted for *Theories in dialogue* / *Clinics haute-couture* / *The Psychosocial Field* sections must be accompanied by abstracts in English and French, and 5 keywords for the article's referencing (they should be chosen in such a way as to enhance this visibility).

Heading levels should be clearly visible (bold and/or italic police and/or numbered). Please do not exceed two levels.

We strongly recommend authors to be consistent in their quotations and bibliography styles (see the journal's bibliography standards).

Academic rigor is essential when it comes to respecting the sources cited, the treatment of subjects and the contextualization of contributions.

Footnotes should be kept to a strict minimum, and should not include bibliographical references. They should be numbered.

Quotations of less than 40 words should be enclosed in quotation marks. Quotations longer than 40 words should be separated from the body of the text. All quotations should be followed by the author's reference, the date and the page number (see the journal's bibliography standards).

The use of italics should be reduced to words in a different language and books or journals titles.
